Hall General Contractors, LLC and is involved in construction/engineering and real estate development in Western Oklahoma as well as ranching operations. Mr. Hall was appointed by Governor Brad Henry in 2003 and reappointed by Governor Mary Fallin in 2011 to serve as a member of the A&M Board of Regents. Mr. Hall received a Bachelor of Science degree in Civil Engineering from Oklahoma State University in 1983, graduating with honors. The Board has provided wise leadership

and service to Panhandle State since 1944. Memorial resolution recognition was given to husband and wife team, Joe and Mary Anne Mayer. Mr. Joe Mayer began his career at Panhandle State in 1968 and he received his Bachelor of Arts degree in Speech with a minor in Business Administration in 1972. Mr. and Mrs. Maver were longtime residents of Guymon, Okla.

Dr. Sandol Johnson was recognized as a retiring faculty member. She first came to Panhandle in 1983 as an Instructor of Animal Science and Firestone Meat Lab Manager. Johnson has been the Department Chair of Animal Science and Professor of Animal Science since 2013. She has been a part of leading the meat judging team and has been an Academic Advisor for the Equestrian Team. One of her proudest accomplishments is when a new student will introduce themselves and say, "You taught my parents years ago and they said I had to take one of your classes."

Jorge Rosas brought greetings as the Student Government Association President. Rosas came to Panhandle State from Felt, Okla. He is a double major in Marketing and Computer Information Systems and he has been a part of Video Game Club, AITP, PBL, and SGA.

Panhandle State graduated a total of 326 students this year, with 33 and 109 graduating in the summer and fall, respectively, and 142 walking the stage in May.



MEN'S AND WOMEN'S TEAMS **QUALIFY FOR CNFR** Released by Panhandle State Campus Communications

The Oklahoma Panhandle State University Rodeo Team hosted the last college rodeo of the year right here in Guymon, Okla. The team put on a great rodeo and was very successful in the arena. The women's team won the rodeo and the men's team placed third. In the year as a whole, both teams won second place in the Central Plains Region, which allows them to take a full team to the College National Finals Rodeo (CNFR) consisting of six men and four women.

Jade Taton had a great weekend in the bareback riding winning the first round with a score of 80 points and placing second in the second round with a score of 68 points. Not only did Taton win the weekend, he also won the year-end title making him a CNFR qualifier.

Hadly McCormick was very consistent this weekend in the tie-down roping. McCormick turned in times of 11.1 seconds in both the long round and the short round giving him the reserve champion title for the weekend. Quint Bell also made the short round in the tie-down roping and won sixth in the short round and sixth in the average.

Five out of the 10 breakaway ropers in the short round were from Panhandle State. Hagen Brunson split for second place in the long round with a time of 2.3 seconds. Brunson placed fourth in the short round with a time of 4.5 seconds giving her the third place in the average. Beau Peterson was 2.6 seconds in the long round and 4.3 seconds in the short round placing her fourth in the

average. Ayvree Smith rode the horse of the year, Rambo, and had a time of 2.1 seconds in the long round and 13 seconds in the short round with a ten second penalty. Smith placed fifth in the average. Sierra Smith and Mariah Dermody also made it to the short round, but unfortunately got no times in the short round.

Dawson Dahm scored 75 points in the long round. Dahm then scored 77 points in the short round placing him second in the round and second in the average. Dahm won the year-end title making him another of our CNFR 2019 qualifiers. Ira Dickinson won fifth in the average. Sam Martin won sixth in the average. Tanner Hays also gualified for the short round, but did not place in the average.

Ouint Bell also made the short round in the steer wrestling. Bell placed fourth in the long round with a time of 8.6 seconds. Bell then had a time of 8.9 seconds in the short round placing him third in the average. Lane Giovanetti was also in the steer wrestling short round and placed fifth in the average.

Panhandle State won the first through fourth place in the goat tying this weekend and the first through third place in the yearend. Kaylee Smith had a perfect weekend in the goat tying. Smith won both rounds and the average with the two fastest times of the rodeo. Smith therefore secured her spot as the 2019 Goat-Tying Champion gualifying her for the 2019 CNFR. Baylee Henderson won second in the average. Sierra Smith and Linzie Van Horn tied for third in the average.

Beau Peterson did not have the weekend she expected with her goat getting up in the long round, but still won second in the region followed by Sierra Smith in third place. These three girls will therefore be competing at the CNFR in June.

Luke Meier and his partner won second in the long round of the team roping with a time of 6.9 seconds. The team then placed third in both the short round and the average. Trey Hall and his partner placed sixth in the long round, but did not get a time in the short round.

There is still one spot to fill on the women's team and three spots to fill on the men's team that will be heading to Casper, Wyo. for the CNFR in June. Coach Robert Etbauer and Assistant Coach Shelbie Weeder Rose will decide whom the best candidates would be to fill these spots. The rodeo team would like the thank the community for such a great turn out at their rodeo and show appreciation to everyone who has made this successful year possible. The teams will keep up the hard work and be ready to keep the winning tradition alive at the CNFR. P

AGGIE RODEO **READY TO RIDE**

The Oklahoma Panhandle State University men's and women's rodeo teams will be trying to make some program history when they travel to the College National Finals Rodeo (CNFR) on June 7-15, 2019 in Casper, Wyoming. The Aggie men will be sending six competitors, along with four representatives for the Panhandle ladies, after both squads finished second in the final 2019 National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association Central Plains Region rankings.

Winners of seven men's team titles over the years, the Aggie cowboys will be looking to wrangle a third-consecutive CNFR national championship in 2019. OPSU won back-to-back crowns in 1997 and 1998, as well as 2017 and 2018. Panhandle State's men will be competing in three events: Saddle Bronc, Bareback and Bull Riding.

In Saddle Bronc, Panhandle will be sending the Nos. 1, 4, 6, 7 and 8 ranked riders in the region to Casper. Sophomore Dawson Dahm (Tomahawk, Alberta, Canada) led the Central Plains Region with 870 points in Saddle Bronc, after finishing second in the event at the 2018 CNFR (to teammate Jake Finlay).

Joining Dahm in Saddle Bronc will be sophomore Cooper Thatcher (Darbalara, New South Wales, Australia) at No. 4 in the region, senior Cody Ballard (Tumut, Australia) at No. 6, senior Tanner Hayes (Elkhart, Kan.) at No. 7 and Jade Taton



Senior Dustin Martinez (Guymon, Okla.) rounds out the Panhandle men's entrants. Martinez heads to the CNFR as the No. 3-rated Bull Rider from the Central Plains Region. Martinez placed ninth at last year's CNFR event.


Head coach Robert Etbauer's cowgirls will be looking to help the Aggies' rodeo program complete the "CNFR Slam," needing a championship in Goat Tying to give OPSU an individual national champion in every event offered at the CNFR in its history. If ever there were a chance to reach that benchmark, it is this year as all four Aggie ladies – senior Kaylee Ann Smith (Jay Em, Wyo.), freshman Beau Peterson (Council Grove, Kan.), junior Sierra Smith (Winterset, Iowa) and senior Baylee Henderson (Dusty, N.M.) - are all entered in the Goat Tying competition.

K. Smith, Peterson and S. Smith were the Nos. 1-3-ranked competitors in the region for 2019, with Henderson ranked No. 8. Kaylee Ann Smith placed 23rd at the 2018 CNFR in Goat Tying and racked up a total of 1,055 points heading into the championships in 2019. **P**

As President of the State Board of Agriculture, Mr. Joe D. Hall is one of the nine appointed members of the Oklahoma A&M Board of Regents, and on Monday, April 22, 2019 Mr. Hall visited the Oklahoma Panhandle State University campus and sat down with about 25 Panhandle State students, including representatives from all college departments on campus.

"Regent Hall has had a significant impact in my life and it was an honor to have him here on campus to share his wisdom and knowledge with our students. He is a great man and his passion for higher education is inspiring," said Dr. Tim Faltyn.

After being welcomed by President Faltyn, Mr. Hall took a few moments to introduce himself to those in attendance and then quickly turned his focus to the students. Students introduced themselves, noting their home state and town, which ranged from Oklahoma, Colorado, Kansas, Texas, Mississippi, Georgia, and even as far as Australia and the Czech Republic. Hall used the diversity in the room as an opportunity to explain a bit more of his philosophy on higher education stating, "That's what education is about at this level. Academics are a priority, but higher education becomes a broadening of your life. You may not realize what you are learning about yourself, your peers, and their cultures every day."

Mr. Hall briefly discussed growing up in Elk City, Okla., his time as a student at Oklahoma State University, and his current family dynamics. He also took some time to talk about his business, Joe D. Hall General Contractors, LLC, which he founded in 1985 and is involved in construction/engineering and real estate development in western Oklahoma, including the Panhandle. The remainder of the one-hour session was treated as a question and answer discussion in which students asked questions on a wide variety of topics, including the specifics of Mr. Hall's business, the purpose and powers of the State Board of Regents, and how he successfully manages his busy schedule. Mr. Hall answered all of the questions in a conscientious and thoughtful manner, and expressed his commitment multiple times in continuing to provide accessibility to higher education for students in outlying areas of Oklahoma.

Mr. Hall explained how his life experiences led him to the life he lives now, noting that he is a believer that you never know where life is going to take you, so you should embrace every moment in which you find yourself.

He also stressed his view that money is not the source of all life's happiness and that you must find purpose and meaning in the things that you do every day. Mr. Hall expressed the importance of higher education in today's job market where good employees are a hot commodity, stating, "A college education proves that you have the discipline and the intelligence to achieve the goals that you have set for yourself. Because of this you will have unlimited opportunities as to where you can go."

Mr. Hall concluded the session by emphasizing the importance of treating people right and handling your personal and business affairs fairly and honestly, noting that many things in life and business come full circle, and going on to say, "If you provide a good service you will not need to worry about profit." His last remark was about being a lifelong learner and then pouring all of the knowledge that you accumulate into other people. He stated, "Oftentimes the person teaching a class will benefit more than the person they are teaching, because of the preparation they put in." Everyone in attendance, both faculty and students, were very appreciative of Mr. Hall's time and words of wisdom.

The Oklahoma Panhandle State University Agronomy Department made a great showing at the annual North American Colleges and Teachers of Agriculture (NACTA) Judging Conference. The event was held at Murray State University in Murray, Ky. April 10-13, 2019.

ATHLETES OF THE YEAR HONORED AT 'NIGHT OF THE AGGIES' AWARD CEREMONY

The Oklahoma Panhandle State University Athletics Department took some time to honor its own at its annual awards event - the Night of the Aggies - held Monday evening on campus at the Hughes-Strong Auditorium. In all, a total of 31 presentations were made to various individuals and teams, recognizing not only athletic prowess, but also community service and academic excellence.

Panhandle State's top award for female and male Athletes of the Year were very tough choices, with ample quality performances. But in the end, sophomore softball player Jewell Lee and senior men's basketball standout Breiman Alexander won the honors.

These awards represent superlative athletic accomplishments by the individual.

Lee has led her team to the SAC post season in both 2018 and 2019. Last year, she became the fist-ever All-American in OPSU program school history and was also honored as all-region and all-SAC. The centerfielder ranked within the top-20 of the conference standings for Fielding Percentage (.963) and was the SAC's No. 1-ranked hitter with a batting average of .456 for the season. She ranked sixth in the nation for Total Hits (88) and finished first in the conference for Triples with six.

Alexander was an All-American and All-SAC selection this season. He led the nation in three-point field goals made, ranking second in scoring and setting an NAIA All-Star Game record for three-point field goals in a game to earn MVP honors. Alexander led the SAC in scoring (23.8 p.p.g.), total points scored (642), three-point field goals made (116) and three-point field goals made per game (4.3). He was seventh in the SAC in three-point field goal percentage (38.2%) and ninth in free-throw percentage (78.2%).

He was also 12th in assists per game (2.6 a.p.g.), 16th in total assists (70) and 13th in field goal percentage (44.1%).

Dr. Julie Dinger, OPSU Vice-President for Academics and Student Affairs, gave a welcome and remarks on behalf of the University's administration. Master of Ceremonies Derek Barton, the "Voice of the Aggies," began the evening's festivities with a review of highlights from 2018-19. From there, each program presented its Aggie Award, followed by the roster of Athletics department-wide awards **P**

SAC HONORS NUMEROUS FOR **BASEBALL AND** SOFTBALL

As the Panhandle State baseball and softball post-season play wrap up, both teams boasted numerous All-Sooner Athletic Conference honorees.

Six Panhandle State Baseball athletes have earned recognition as the All-Sooner conference teams and Gold Glove selections were announced Wednesday (May 8) afternoon.

Catcher Luis Rodriguez has helped the Aggie Baseball team make history as he earned baseball's first-ever First Team All-Conference nod. Rodriguez had a spectacular sophomore year, leading the Aggies in batting average at .372 gaining him the No. 10 ranking in the SAC. Rodriguez also tops the team in RBI with 43 on the season, putting him at 13th in the rankings, as well as six-spot in RBI/Game, averaging .96 per outing. Over his 45 games played, Rodriguez produced seven doubles and eight home runs, earned 32 walks and 85 total bases, and concluded the season with only 13 strikeouts on his 145 at-bats. Rodriguez' excellent agility behind the plate earned him a .983 fielding percentage and a spot at No. 12 in the conference rankings.

The Aggies also featured three Second Team All-Conference selections in center fielder Payton Rhodes, pitcher Yesiel Valdez and second baseman Gerson Padilla. Panhandle also pulled in three Gold Glove winners in left fielder Bradley Ruiz, first baseman Jared Mayeda and Gerson Padilla also earned the accolade in addition to his second-team recognition.

The Oklahoma Panhandle State University softball team, fresh off of its best season in program history, had four of its players – Jewell Lee, Brittany Thomas, Kaylor Battiest, and Abby Gregory earn All-Sooner Athletic Conference honors. Additionally, Thomas was voted as the SAC's Freshman of the Year.For Lee, a sophomore centerfielder who was an NAIA All-American second team as a freshman, it was her second-consecutive first team All-SAC recognition. Lee finished the season with a .335 batting average and had a team-leading 48 runs scored, which ranked seventh in the league. She had 13 extra-base hits (8 doubles, 4 triples and a home run) and drove in 31 runs. Lee sported a .416 on-base average and drew 22 walks, as well.

Thomas, a freshman designated player who also made a few spot appearances from the circle, earned All-SAC first team and the Freshman of the Year award after leading the Aggies with a .372 batting average (45-121). Thomas ranked No. 12 in the SAC for batting average and was 17th in homers. She also had eight doubles and a triple to her credit, driving in 28 runs (ranking 14th in the SAC in RBI per game. She was also 13th in total bases per game and 20th in doubles per game among the SAC stats. **P**


