




## **FUTURE EDUCATORS**

#### TEACHING PATHWAYS AT OPSU

#### The College of Arts and Education at OPSU

recently hosted Future Educators Day, an event bringing together current students and aspiring educators from different high schools. Dr. Kimberly Conyers and Mrs. Amber Hollis-Fesmire led the event, which aimed to provide students with insight into the world of education, especially at OPSU, and the opportunities available within the field.

Students learned about practical advice on residential life, admissions procedures, and scholarship opportunities. Among the scholarships, the highlighted OPSU Scholarship was the Panhandle Promise Scholarship. The Panhandle Promise Scholarship, a gap funding scholarship for aspiring teachers, removes the financial barrier and incentivizes students to pursue classroom teacher degrees in exchange for a two-year commitment to teach in an Oklahoma Panhandle public school. The Inspired to Teach scholarship, an initiative by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education (OSRHE) designed to support aspiring teachers in their academic pursuits, was also highlighted.

"Our first Panhandle Promise scholarships were offered to five students in 2019-2020. Since then, the scholarship has been awarded to 14 other OPSU education majors—many of whom are still teaching in the Panhandle," stated Dr. Charla Lewis, Dean of the College of Arts and Education. "Inspired to Teach has been available to education majors since fall 2022. While the commitment for graduates to teach in Oklahoma is five years for this scholarship (three years more than the Panhandle Promise), awardees will get paid an employment incentive for those five years. We're very lucky to be able to offer these two scholarships to our education students."

Throughout the event, education staff from diverse disciplines such as agriculture, mathematics, English, health and physical education, and elementary education were on hand to engage with students and shed light on the distinct pathways within the education sector. This multidisciplinary approach ensured that students gained a comprehensive understanding of the educational landscape and the various specializations available to them. They also experienced hands-on learning with technology and engaging in craft activities. These interactive sessions showcased the innovative tools and resources available to students at OPSU.

OPSU elementary education student Ceely Jones shared her experiences and insights, offering a glimpse into the realities of pursuing an education degree at OPSU. Her firsthand accounts gave aspiring educators valuable perspective and inspiration, reaffirming their passion for the profession.

Dr. Conyers emphasized the importance of providing prospective students with opportunities to experience firsthand the dynamic learning environment at OPSU. "It's important to have days like these where we can showcase our degrees," she remarked. "The Future Educators Day was the first of what I hope to be many opportunities that we give interested students to let them experience what 'a day in the life' of a teaching major would be like at OPSU. We want to make sure students know what we have to offer and that we are the Path to Anywhere."

With the Panhandle Promise scholarship deadline nearing on June 1st, the event served as a timely reminder for aspiring teachers to explore the scholarship opportunities available to them as they pursue their academic and professional aspirations. OPSU remains steadfast in its commitment to nurturing the next generation of educators and empowering them to make a meaningful difference in the lives of others.

## **OPSU STUDENTS** WIN NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

AT NACTA CONFERENCE



The OPSU College of Agriculture, Science, and Nursing attended the North American Colleges and Teachers of Agriculture (NACTA) Judging conference, where 23 students competed in various competitions. NACTA started in 1955 and has held an annual event each spring where teams of college students in agricultural institutions compete in various contests. This year, the judging conference was held on the campus of Southern Idaho with representatives from across the country and competing schools like Purdue University, Texas Tech University, Oklahoma State University, Kansas State University, and many more.

The Panhandle State team was led by Dean of Agriculture Tracy Kincannon and Agriculture faculty members Dr. Curtis Bensch, Dr. Crystal Tolle, Kathryn Hearn, and Cassidy Tolle-Johnson. Competing in 10 contests over three days, including Agriculture Education, Agriculture Mechanics, Crops Judging, Dairy Judging, Equine Management and Judging, Knowledge Bowl, Livestock Judging, Livestock Management, Natural Resources Management, and Precision Agriculture, the students demonstrated remarkable skill and determination.

While all students achieved notable success, one team rose to the top. The Livestock Management Team was named National Champions. Additionally, Toby McClure earned the distinction of 2nd high individual, with JD Fox placing 3rd high individual and Elizabeth Ross securing 4th high individual. The team's victory, with a margin of 63 points, is an impressive feat in such a competitive environment. Other valuable team members included Makenzie Webster, Austin Jacobs, and Jake Hinds, under the coaching expertise of Kathryn Hearn.

In addition to the national championship, several other teams earned prestigious national standings. The Natural Resources team secured a reserve national title, while the Livestock Judging, Precision Agriculture, Agriculture Mechanics, and Dairy Judging teams earned a 3rd place national finish. The Agriculture Education and Equine Management teams also performed admirably, securing a 4th place national finish.

Dean Tracy Kincannon stated, "This group of NACTA Judging rookies worked very hard and missed taking down the defending sweepstakes champion by just a few points."

This year's achievements reflect the student's and faculty's dedication and hard work. They eagerly anticipate another exciting year and hope for further success at the event next April at West Texas A&M University. P

Concluding the spring semester, Dean Kincannon was presented the Lamar Community College Premiere Partner Award for 2023-2024. This award recognizes the outstanding collaboration between OPSU Agriculture College and Lamar Community College in hosting the Colorado FFA Southeast District Contest. This past spring, with the support of OPSU professors and students, Lamar Community College successfully hosted over 900 students from across Southern Colorado for FFA career development events. OPSU played a significant role in assisting with the livestock and meat judging contests. While assisting those contests, our faculty and students helped organize livestock and meat judging classes and organized the officials for each contest. This served as a great opportunity to build our connection with Lamar Community College and connect with students from all over southern Colorado.

The championship competition spans three days. Kamron Neal, a freshman from Houston, Texas, with a position of running sprints on the OPSU Men's Track Team, secured a strong third-place finish in the men's 200-meter final. Neal saw a personal best on the first day of the championship in the 200 meters.


Neal stated, "The National meet went smoothly. I'm proud of myself as a freshman, but finishing in third place motivated me to work even harder the next year. I promised myself that the following year, I wouldn't lose. Furthermore, I truly value my teammate's encouragement. They were always there to support me when I saw them both before and after the event, and that helped a lot."

Head Coach Cyrus Hall stated, "Kamron ran phenomenally at the meet! His first 100m-120m was incredible! He has an uncanny ability to bounce back from adversity. He did that today in a big-time way! I couldn't be prouder of the year he had. 3rd in the nation as a freshman is fantastic! We thought he'd have a chance to win, and he went for it. Aggie Nation should be proud."

Neal had a full scholarship to another school in Kansas, but when there was a coaching change, and the new coaching staff decided not to honor the scholarship he was given, he started looking at other options. OPSU quarterback and friend of Neal's, Brandon Stephens, connected him with Head Football Coach Cory Miller. Coach Miller offered Neal a scholarship, but Neal also wanted to run track. Coach Miller and Coach Hall offered Neal an opportunity to play football and run track at OPSU.
